BYE-LAWS

1.—That the Society be called “ The Broomfield Cottage Gardeners’ Society.” The Officers shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Committee, Honorary Secretary or Secretaries, and Treasurer or Treasurers, who shall be elected annually by the subscribers.

2.—That the Society shall consist of persons residing within the parish subscribing 2/6 and upwards, per annum.

NOTE.—ALL PERSONS RESIDING WITHIN THE OLD BROOMFIELD BOUNDARY ARE ELIGIBLE FOR MEMBERSHIP.

REGULATIONS

1.—Members shall be entitled to one ticket of admission to the Shows, and the right to exhibit without charge.

2.—No person shall be permitted to compete in Section “ B ” who gains any part of his living by growing flowers, fruit or vegetables for sale, or for an employer.

3.—No person shall be allowed to exhibit for a prize any plant or garden produce that has not been in his or her possession at least three months previous to the day of exhibition, unless raised from seed within a shorter period. All industrial work must be the production of the exhibitor.

4.—Exhibits must be staged on the morning of the show between the hours of 7.30 and 10.30, and remain till the closing of the show. *This Rule will be strictly enforced.*

5.—Exhibitors will receive Cards in order to distinguish their exhibits. These Cards must be placed on the exhibits at the time of staging.

6.—The Judges shall have power to withhold or modify any prizes where they consider the exhibits of insufficient merit, or where they are few in number.

7.—The decision of the Judges on all points relative to the respective merits of exhibits, and that of the Committee as to the interpretation of the Schedule, Rules and Regulations, is final.

8.—Intending Exhibitors must **give seven** clear days’ notice before the show, to the Secretary, of the classes in which they intend to exhibit. Competitors are only entitled to stage one entry in each class. In no case will exhibitors be allowed to stage other exhibits in place of those entered.

9.—All Competitors for the Cultivated Garden or Allotment Class must give notice to the Secretary **six** weeks previous to the Show.

10.—All Fruit must be exhibited on plates or dishes provided by the exhibitor. All roots must be washed.

11.—The Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits, from whatever cause arising, and all articles must be at sole risk of their respective owners.

12.—The Gardens or Allotments of Competitors will be **visited**.
