RULES.

1. That the Society be called "The Broomfield Cottage Gardeners' Society". The Officers shall consist of a President, Vice-Presidents, Chairman, Committee, Hon. Secretary or Hon. Secretaries, and Hon. Treasurer or Hon. Treasurers, who shall be elected annually by the subscribers.
2. That the Society shall consist of persons residing within the parish subscribing 2/6 and upwards, per annum. All persons resident within the old Broomfield boundary which includes the area from First Avenue to the foot of Gutters Hill are eligible for membership.
3. Any monies received by the Broomfield Cottage Gardeners' Society from subscriptions or otherwise shall be devoted exclusively to furthering the activities of the Society.
4. Members shall be entitled to one ticket of admission to the Shows, and the right to exhibit without charge.
5. No person shall be permitted to compete in Section B who gains any part of his living by growing flowers, fruit or vegetables for sale, or for an employer.
6. No person shall be allowed to exhibit for a prize any plant or garden produce that has not been in his or her possession at least three months previous to the day of the exhibition, unless raised from seed within a shorter period. All industrial work must be the production of the exhibitor.
7. Exhibits must be staged on the morning of the Show between the hours of 7.30 and 10.30, and remain till the closing of the Show. This Rule will be strictly enforced.
8. Exhibitors will receive Cards in order to distinguish their exhibits. These cards must be placed on the exhibits at the time of staging.
9. The Judges shall have power to withhold or modify any prizes where they consider the exhibits of insufficient merit, or where they are few in number, but may not increase the number of prizes except at the discretion of the Committee.
10. The decision of the Judges on all points relative to the respective merits of exhibits, and that of the Committee as to the interpretation of the Schedule and Rules is final.
11. Intending exhibitors must notify the Secretary on the official entry form, seven clear days before the Show of the class or classes in which they intend to exhibit. Competitors are only entitled to stage one entry in each class. In no case will exhibitors be allowed to stage other exhibits in place of those entered.
12. All competitors for the Cultivated home garden or allotment classes must notify the Secretary in writing, six weeks previous to the Show.
13. All Fruit must be exhibited on plates or dishes provided by the exhibitor. All roots must be washed.
14. The Committee will not be responsible for any loss or damage to exhibits, from whatever cause arising, and all articles must be at sole risk of their respective owners.
15. The Gardens or Allotments of Competitors will be visited.

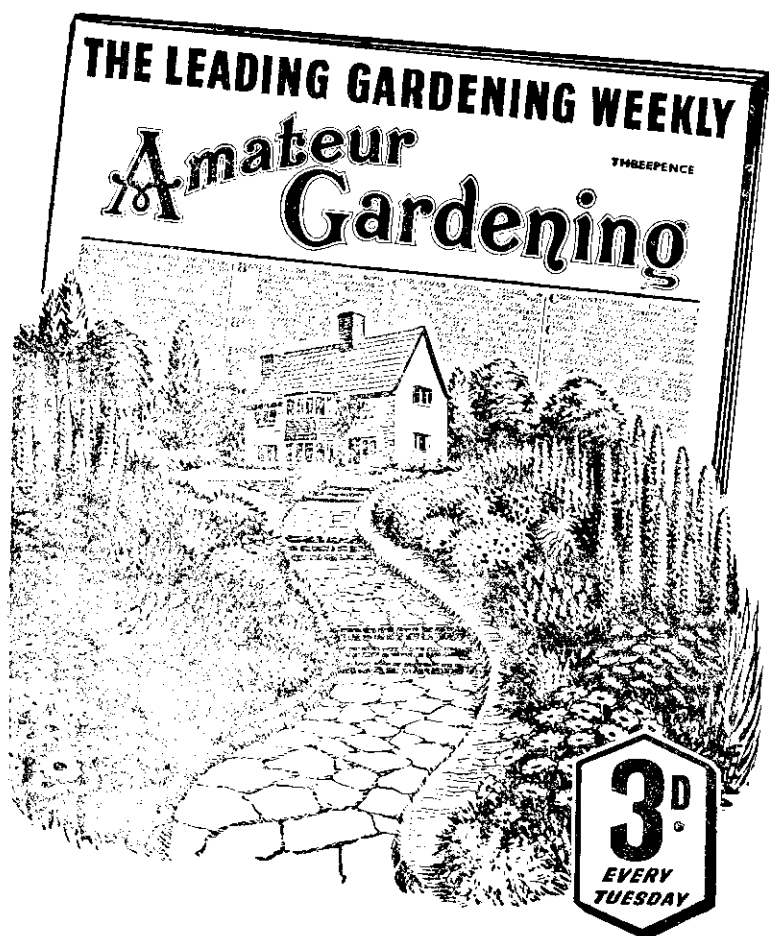

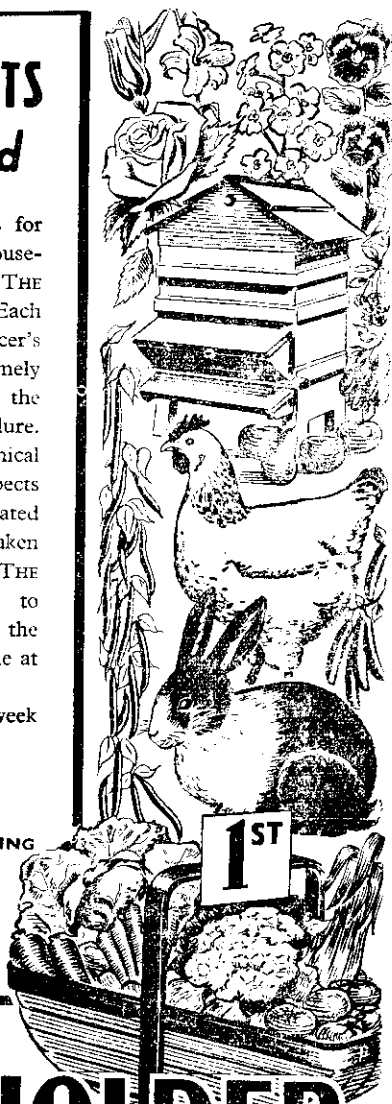
